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New Children at the Youth Home

The two most recent additions to the Youth Home have been David and Christina. Both children come to us with very traumatic and potentially deadly circumstances. Sometimes, it is unimaginable to hear what the lives of the children were like before they came to us. These two stories, though different from one another, are not unique to the stories of other children that are with us at the Hope Restoration Youth Home.

David's mother approached Penny after a church service that missionaries from the US had given. She began to beg with tear filled eyes that we take her son to the Orphanage.

Pilirani, his mother, began to tell a story of how she had been widowed when David was a very small boy of 2 or 3 years of age. In Malawi and other places in Africa women find it necessary to wed even if the relationship is not one of love to be able to survive. That was the case with Pilirani.

Her second husband did not like David because he came from a previous marriage and refused to let Pilirani to feed or house the young boy in their home. He was sent to stay outside in a shed meant for animals. He was physically abused as well by the step father and Pilirani knew the only chance he had to survive was to live with her mother.

After living with his grandmother until the age of 8 she suddenly passed away.

When the team from America came and she had heard of the Youth Home in Ntcheu she begged for him to be taken in.

It was a very easy decision for the staff and board of Give Back Hope Intl. to make room for this beautiful young boy even though we had to make adjustments in order to make room in the already full boy's quarters.

Filled with trepidation at leaving a mother he loved, he also knew that it was his only chance to survive!

After only a few days David began to run and play with his new brothers and sisters and is now doing really well in school.

The love that David has felt in a very short time has literally transformed him and he fits right in amongst all his brothers and sisters.





The news of the children and the Youth Home has spread to many areas far beyond the small village of Ntcheu.

Recently, on a trip to her home in Blantyre our Director Emily was approached by a grandmother of a young girl only 10 years of age. She told Emily of her plight to take care of her orphaned granddaughter and how she barely had enough food for both herself and Christina. But, together they lived a quiet life and she was able to find the meager school fees to send her to school.

However, one day when walking home from school three older boys savagely attacked her. Traumatized, she told her grandmother of what had happened and she was taken to the police to tell her story.

At the police station Christina refused to tell the names of the boys as they had promised to strangle her if she disclosed their names.

Refusing to leave her home or go to school Christina feared for her life every day.

When Emily was asked if she could take her back to the Youth Home she wrote a plea to the board on the behalf of Christina that we would make room for her.

It was again an easy decision to have her transported with Emily back to the home.

The girls used their sewing skills to make her school uniform and little Christina is now enrolled in school and is acclimating to life at the home.

It is so difficult to say no to any child but we are at our limit at the Youth Home. Please, will you pray with us that we can expand and build our own property and have room for many more children like this?

t has been the hope and dream of the children and staff at the Youth Home in Malawi for many years that we have our own land and buildings.

For the last few years, we have been extremely blessed with the property and buildings that we are currently living at. However, we have outgrown the facility and need the true security of not being confined by the rules and restrictions of a landlord.

If the landlord would decide to sell the property or change the rules it would be devastating. We would possibly be forced to buy at a very high price in order to remain together and the property does not fit our vision.

We now have to send the kids to other areas miles away to participate in activities, or even kick a ball and play because of the limited space on the property. This is not only difficult for the staff to manage but also unsafe for the children.

It is our vision to purchase property so that we can grow in many ways. Of course, our first area of growth would be to be able to have more room for new little brothers and sisters. We are questioned weekly about taking in more kids that are in desperate situations and we cannot accept them because we are now at full capacity.

Our vision is to purchase land with at least 10 acres to begin with the option to buy more as we grow. There would be space for large buildings for both the girls and boys separately and a separate room for a house parent or

parents. That way each dorm or house has a feeling of family.



The land would allow for our own garden and ability to raise our own food and meat. It is important to continue to move in a direction to be in a position to be as self sufficient as possible. In time this model can be duplicated in other areas when successful.

Other areas of vision are: A large play area for volleyball, soccer and other activities, medical house, school, housing for widows, vocational training and covered cook house.

We have found land on the outskirts of Ntcheu that would have the number of acres and possibility of purchase of adjoining land. It has access to electricity and a well for water.

The amount that we anticipate needing to raise for the land purchase and well this year is \$10,000.00 and \$50,000.00 over the next 5 years for buildings.

We are believing for great things for the kids and staff of Malawi!

ast year as we saw the prices of Maize and other food staples rising in Malawi our director Emily, suggested that we rent a large plot of land close by the Youth Home to raise some of our own food.

Maize, is basically corn that is ground into a fine powder and mixed with water and poured into a large pot and cooked to a paste that is eaten as a meal or with vegetables and fish or meat. In different regions



it is prepared differently but every Malawian eats this as a staple.



Over the last year we have seen prices rise from the normal prices of between \$10-\$12(depending on the season) for a 50 lb bag to \$24.00 per bag at this time. Emily just reported that there are places that Maize is now being sold for \$50.00 a bag. This is a food CRISIS!

This price increase is possibly due to the recent Hurricane that devastated many parts of Mozambique and Malawi called Hurricane Freddy. Just as the crops were ready for harvest they were ruined by rains as much

as 20 inches per day.

However, the hand of God preserved our crops and we will be harvesting a bumper crop of Maize and beans soon. It is estimated that we will have as much as 50-75 bags or more of Maize for the children to eat.

It will take every child and staff member to harvest, shuck and bag the crop as they have no convenience of motorized machinery but each one is happy to participate knowing that they have been blessed beyond measure.

Please! Pray for the country of Malawi and Mozambique as many people will not have the ability to pay this exorbitant price for food.

We also would like to purchase 3 more double beds so that each child has their own bed to sleep in and call their own!

Right now, the kids are currently competing against each other to see which of them will be selected as a part of a group of eight, composed of four girls and four boys, to represent the group at an upcoming tournament in Monkey Bay, Malawi, during the upcoming holiday season.

The children are very serious and enthusiastic about their love of tennis, and hope to continue playing at higher levels. Because of the support we receive from donors, we were able to provide the children with shoes so they no longer have to play barefoot...and we can keep that hope alive!

and academically. He has always been on the failing side in the previous terms. As of now he


has improved a lot and passed previous term with good grades.

However, because they could only see videos on the director's phone, it was a challenge. Since then, they have a way to connect to a larger screen and through Lenson, the assistant director, the lessons are shared frequently. The children also send videos of responses to the lessons and their testimonies. The Lord is working a mighty work in those children!

Last fall, Penny was able to travel to Malawi and see the children in person. They finally were able to receive the gifts the Kingdom Kids had prepared for them a year and a half before and it was such a joy to see their happy faces.

Hi, my name is Evelyn! I have come with my testimony. As soon as I came here at the youth home, I found my friends baking mandasi. I went there to learn how to bake. As we were baking, I took some mandasi. I threw it into the pot while it had some water. When the cooking oil exploded and the fire started I was burnt in the face. I jumped and started crying. My friends went to get a chair for me and I was seated on the outside for proper aeration. Then I was taken to the hospital, where the doctor said it was too extreme for the hospital, but I was referred to another hospital. As I was going to that hospital, all of my face was swollen and even my mouth was swollen. When they started treating me in the face, I was given medication around my face. After that we started off coming back to Ntcheu. As of now my face is back to normal. I am thanking God for that. I didn't know my face would come back to normal.
